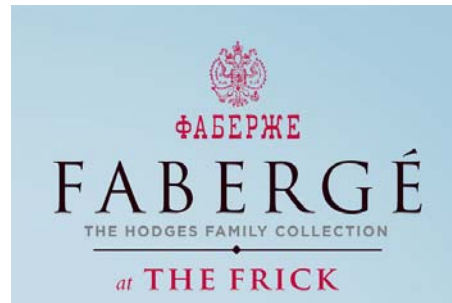


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LAST CHANCE FOR FABERGÉ AT THE FRICK

***Fabergé: The Hodges Family Collection* remains on view
at The Frick Art Museum through January 15, 2012**

PITTSBURGH, PA, January 4, 2012— *Fabergé: The Hodges Family Collection*, the first major exhibition of Fabergé objects to be shown in Pittsburgh, is in its final days at the Frick Art & Historical Center. The exhibition, which has been extremely popular since its opening in late October, will be on view through Sunday, January 15, 2012.

The exhibition features more than 100 objects made by the world-renowned House of Fabergé, goldsmith and jeweler to the Russian court. The Frick is complementing the exhibition by displaying select items from its collection of fine 18th- and 19th-century Russian decorative arts, including an enameled Russian tea set made by A.I. Kuzmichev, purchased by Henry Clay Frick through Tiffany & Co. in 1894, and Russian silver purchased by Helen Clay Frick.

All That Glitters: Luxury in the Gilded Age—a special installation at Clayton that focuses on decorative luxury objects in the collection manufactured by firms such as Tiffany; Gorham; and Bailey, Banks and Biddle—also runs through January 15, 2012. In addition, the special Fabergé Exhibition Shop, inspired by the opulent and glittering world of Fabergé and Russian decorative

and folk art, will remain open for business through January 15, 2012.

The Frick's extended hours of operation provide additional opportunities for the public to experience these special offerings. Through January 15, 2012, the Frick is open from 10:00 a.m. – 5:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, Friday, Saturday, and Sunday. On Thursdays, the entire site—including The Café at the Frick, serving Russian-inspired menu items— is open from 10:00 a.m. – 9:00 p.m.
