- The **Car and Carriage Museum** illustrates the history of transportation from carriages to the early decades of the automobile.
- **Clayton** is the remarkably preserved home of the Henry Clay Frick family, a one-of-a-kind tool for learning about life in 19th-century Pittsburgh.
- **The Frick Art Museum** displays a permanent collection of art that belonged to the Frick family, as well as an ever-changing array of diverse special exhibitions.
- The **historic greenhouse** is still operational. Along with the landscaped grounds, students have the opportunity to explore and learn from nature.





What You Need to Know

- Book early! Certain times of the year (like December and May) fill more quickly than others. Call at least two months before your preferred date.
- Not sure what program is best for you? We are happy to talk with you to customize a program to fit your classroom's needs.
- Only interested in touring one of our museums? Guided tours of one museum of your choice are available at the cost of \$7 per student.
- The earliest time that programs begin is 9:30 a.m.
- Lunchroom use and time is included in some programs. Look for the 🍽️ icon. If lunch time is not part of your program, facilities may be available for \$30. Check when you book, and remember to add 30 minutes to your visit.
- Occasionally, certain programs may be temporarily unavailable due to special events, special exhibitions, or closures on site.
- Visits are scheduled on a first-come, first-served basis. To verify that you are officially booked, please check your inbox for a confirmation email and invoice from our reservation system.

Seasons at the Frick

Peak Seasons: Clayton programs in December and May sell out quickly. These program rates include an extra \$1 per student fee.

Fall Early Bird Discount: Get ahead of the busy spring field trip season by scheduling a visit in the fall. Take advantage of our early bird discount by scheduling a program to occur in September or October and save \$2 per student.

Weather Issues: If any weather-related delay or cancellation for your school district results in a program cancellation, we will do our best to reschedule.

Summer Months: Most programs are still available in the summer.

Our Chaperone Policy

Chaperones play an important role in ensuring that everyone gets the most out of their school program at The Frick Pittsburgh. Based on the size of your group, we admit a certain number of chaperones for free. For most programs and grade levels, we suggest a ratio of one chaperone for every eight students. For kindergarten and first grade students, we suggest a ratio of one chaperone to five students. Due to the nature of the program, Letterboxing also requires a ratio of one chaperone to five students.

Personal student aides are always admitted for free. Additional chaperones are admitted at the student rate, with some exceptions. Space considerations may require us to limit the number of additional chaperones.

Photography Policy

Non-flash photography is permitted in the Car and Carriage Museum and The Frick Art Museum permanent collection. Special exhibitions in the art museum can be photographed on a case-by-case basis. Photography of any kind is not allowed in Clayton.

Occasionally, we like to photograph groups participating in our school programs for use in the Frick's publications. In those cases, photography consent forms will be sent to you in advance. You can always decline to have your group photographed, and individual students are also welcome to opt out.



Classroom Outreach Programs

Can't make it to the Frick? We can come to you! These programs are designed as interactive, small group classroom experiences, NOT large group assembly programs.

Assembly Line to Go (4-7)

Students discover the impact of Henry Ford's system—and its effect on labor—as they build cars on a moving assembly line.

Challenged to apply critical thinking and reasoning, students team up to place automotive innovations in chronological order. Touchable antique car tools and accessories give them a hands-on appreciation for how transportation has changed over the last 120 years and encourage them to think what future car innovation will bring.

Group size: Group minimum of 20 students. Students work in small groups; can do multiple consecutive groups in one day.

Fee: \$3.00 per student plus travel fee per day based on mileage

Duration: 50-75 minutes

History Apprenticeship (5-8)

Students participate in a series of hands-on, object-based exercises that help them develop the skills of an historian, including careful observation, deductive reasoning and critical thinking.

We'll bring a mix of artifacts from the past, and a variety of primary sources including photographs, receipts and letters.

Group size: Group minimum of 20 students. Students work in small groups; can do multiple consecutive groups in one day.

Fee: \$3.00 per student plus travel fee per day based on mileage

Duration: 50-75 minutes

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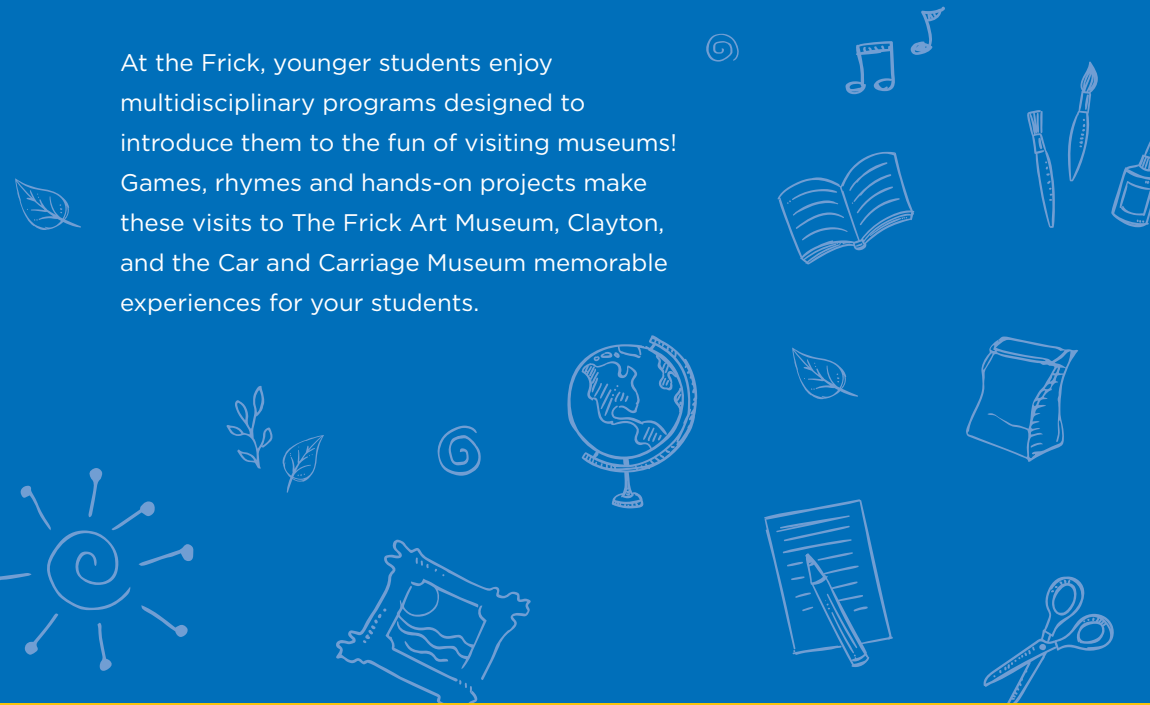


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GRADES K-2

Academic Standards

Recognizing the importance of Pennsylvania academic standards to teachers and schools striving for student achievement, our programs are aligned to address a variety of these standards. We include the arts, humanities and history, along with math, science, reading, writing, speaking, and listening. Writing is integral to several workshops but can also be incorporated into other programs in simple (listing) and complex (dialogue, poetry, short narrative) formats. TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT

The Frick is as invested in providing meaningful learning opportunities for teachers as for their students. Educator workshops and teacher-focused programs bring the Frick to life as a foundational resource to use in and out of the classroom, regardless of content area.

The Frick Pittsburgh is a learning laboratory for art, science, history, and every subject in between. Through engagement with our rich permanent collection and diverse rotating exhibits, as well as the entire 5.5 acres of gardens and grounds, educators can broaden their content knowledge, expand their learning resources, and take necessary time to be students themselves.

Teacher workshops and programs are Act-48 approved, offering arts-integrated, standards-based, multidisciplinary content and innovative, practical, classroom-ready resources.

The Frick also offers custom, in-school and site-based sessions for small groups, as well as seasonal open houses at the Frick.

COMMUNITY PROGRAMS

The Frick offers programs for many community partners who work with a variety of underserved populations. These activities are free of charge to participants, including transportation. Programs promote familiarity and comfort within a museum setting, exposing students to a wide range of collections and helping them to develop the confidence and trust necessary to share ideas and creations.

- **Afterschool** offers a combination of museum visits and Frick staff visits to organizations including Gwen's Girls and Wilkinsburg School District. Working in close cooperation with partnering agencies, Frick educators develop the right mix of art and history programs for participating students.
- We offer two kinds of multi-visit programs with local public schools.
Learning Tree is an environmental education program in which first or second graders alternate visits to the Frick with classroom visits by a Frick educator. Students adopt a tree, plant bulbs and seeds, and learn to appreciate

the relationship between plants, people and the Earth. Literacy is the focus of **School to Museum**, a program made up of a series of monthly visits to the Frick that combines museum collections, reflection and writing, and making art.

- **MATCH**, or "Museum Around the Corner from Here," is a partnership that brings kindergarteners from Pittsburgh Faison Elementary School in Homewood to our site.
- **Spectrum** with Spectrum Charter School in Monroeville is designed to meet the needs of students who have difficulty learning in typical classroom settings. Frick educators engage students in inquiry-based and art-making activities designed to boost self-esteem, recognize social cues, and improve interpersonal relationships.
- **Community Day Camp** welcomes children from area day camps such as the YWCA, YMCA, Boys and Girls Clubs of America, and our afterschool partners to explore the collections, create art, and play on the lawns.

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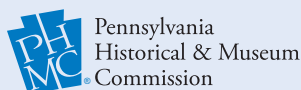
