

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The Frick Pittsburgh to Host Series of Public Programs Alongside Contemporary Art Exhibition Kara Walker: Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated) The exhibition marks an important continuation of the Frick's commitment to reexamine history with a contemporary lens to better understand the present



PITTSBURGH – Visitors to The Frick Pittsburgh will have the opportunity to participate in a series of public programs as part of the 2025 season opening exhibition, <u>"Kara Walker:</u> <u>Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated)</u>" at the Frick Art Museum. The opening day, March 1, coincides with the first day of Women's History Month. The exhibition will be on view through May 25, 2025.

The show will be the first time works by Kara Walker will be exhibited in Pittsburgh since the 1999-2000 Carnegie International. Due to the large-scale nature of Kara Walker's medium, it is rare to see so many of her works in one exhibition. Comprised of 15 large-scale prints, **"Kara Walker: Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated)"** revisits the historical representations found in the 1866 publication "Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War" and overlays enlargements of woodcut plates with Kara Walker's silkscreen cutout figures in solid black silhouette. In doing so, Kara Walker brings to light experiences of racism that were often omitted or merely hinted at in traditional historical narratives. Shown with Kara Walker's series is a group of original "Harper's Weekly" engravings by 19th-century American realist Winslow Homer (1846-1910), offering opportunities to consider similarities and distinctions between past and present.

"Building on the success of *Gilded, Not Golden*, in which we recontextualize our Gilded Age past at Clayton, the Frick family home, I'm excited to extend this initiative by delving into the Civil War—an era that profoundly shaped the Gilded Age. Kara Walker's powerful work exemplifies our continued commitment to reexamining history with fresh eyes and sharing untold stories," said **Amanda Gillen, interim executive director**. "We invite visitors to join us in exploring the complexities of history and how it continues to shape the world we live in today."

The Frick's presentation of the exhibition will include four bound copies of "Harper's Weekly" issues from the years of the Civil War, which were part of the Frick family's library at Clayton.

Heralded as "<u>a global contemporary art superstar</u>," Kara Walker is widely considered to be one of the most important living artists today. At the age of 28, she was awarded a John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation "Genius" grant, becoming the second youngest recipient ever. In 2007, Kara Walker was named one of Time magazine's 100 Most Influential People in the World, Artists and Entertainers, stating, "Few have managed to capture the collision between past and present, between histories and horror stories, between sexuality and shame, between skin and meat, as powerfully and provocatively as Kara Walker."

"Kara Walker is one of the most thought-provoking artists of her generation, and this exhibition is a compelling demonstration of how contemporary artists can serve as witnesses to the past and present," said **Dawn R. Brean, chief curator and director of collections**. "She uses the silhouette–a traditionally genteel art form–in ways that upend viewers' expectations. Her imaginative tableaux raise questions about power, perception, how memory is shaped and how history continues to shape us."

The exhibition will also feature contributions from 15 guest labelists. Contributors include historians, artists, writers, students, and others, who are working with the Frick to offer their perspectives on the work of Kara Walker and Winslow Homer. These guest contributions will be included in the exhibition alongside the interpretive texts.

About the Exhibition

This exhibition pairs Walker's series "Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated)" with original Harper's engravings of the Civil War by Winslow Homer, drawn from the New Britain Museum of American Art's collection. The juxtaposition of these works highlights the distinctions between historical and contemporary perspectives on pivotal American events. Adding a unique dimension to the exhibition is the Frick's own collection, which includes bound copies of the "Harper's Weekly" Civil War issues, owned by the Frick family. This connection offers visitors an opportunity to explore the themes of the exhibition in relation to the Gilded Age and its enduring legacy.

Please note: "Kara Walker: Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated)" contains sensitive imagery and descriptive content related to instances of racially motivated violence in the Civil War South.

There will be a reflection space as part of the exhibition, and images of the exhibition will be available at the Grable Visitor Center for visitors interested in previewing the show's content before entering.

Opening Day Programs and Activities are as follows:

Saturday, March 1 Special Lecture with Gwendolyn DuBois Shaw | "Kara Walker, Winslow Homer, Blackness, & Al"

The keynote lecture considers the ongoing engagement with "Harper's Weekly" illustrations made by Winslow Homer and other artists during the Civil War, by contemporary artists, like Kara Walker, who seek to reframe them, and the everyday art lovers who search for historical images of African Americans to add to their walls. What insight can these contested historic images give us into the desires of the contemporary art market at a time when artificial intelligence is radically reshaping the creation and consumption of art?

A renowned scholar of Kara Walker's work, Dr. Shaw's research focuses on portraiture and issues of representation, with an emphasis on the construction of race, class, gender, and sexuality in the American context. She has previously served on the faculty of Harvard University and as the Director of Research, Publications, and Scholarly Programs at the Smithsonian's National Portrait Gallery. She is the author of "Seeing the Unspeakable: The Art of Kara Walker" (2004) and "The Art of Remembering: Essays on African American Art and History" (2024). <u>Free with registration at</u> <u>TheFrickPittsburgh.org</u>.

Join Dr. Edda Fields-Black for an examination of untold stories and reclaimed histories through her most recent book, "COMBEE: Harriet Tubman, the Combahee River Raid and Black Freedom during the Civil War". COMBEE explores Harriet Tubman's often-overlooked role in the largest slave rebellion in US history that resulted in the liberation of 756 people from bondage on seven rice plantations. Through previously unexamined sources, Dr. Fields-Black herself a descendent of a soldier who fought in the raid—brings to life the Combahee River Raid and the untold stories of those freed, their resilience, and the lasting impact of Tubman's heroism.

Following the book talk, enjoy a light reception and book signing with the author as well as access to "Kara Walker: Harper's Pictorial History of the Civil War (Annotated)". About Kara Walker

New York-based artist Kara Walker is best known for her candid investigation of race, gender, sexuality, and violence through silhouetted figures that have appeared in numerous exhibitions worldwide.

Born in Stockton, California in 1969, Walker was raised in Atlanta, Georgia from the age of 13. She studied at the Atlanta College of Art (BFA, 1991) and the Rhode Island School of Design (MFA, 1994). She is the recipient of many awards, notably the John D. and Catherine T. MacArthur Foundation Achievement Award in 1997, which she received at just 28, making her the second youngest recipient in the award's history, as well as the United States Artists Eileen Harris Norton Fellowship in 2008. In 2012, Walker became a member of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. In 2015, she was named the Tepper Chair in Visual Arts at the Mason Gross School of the Arts at Rutgers University.

Walker's work can be found in museums and public collections throughout the United States and Europe including The Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, New York; The Museum of Modern Art, New York; The Metropolitan Museum of Art, New York; The Tate Gallery, London; the Museo Nazionale delle Arti del XXI Secolo (MAXXI), Rome; and Deutsche Bank, Frankfurt.
